The White Oak is a slower-growing oak species. The habit is pyramidal when young, becoming more rounded with age. Leaf tips are rounded, about one-half as wide as they are long. Dark green leaves turn red-purple in Fall. Acorns produced are a food source for wildlife. Timber is used for furniture, flooring, and other finished products.

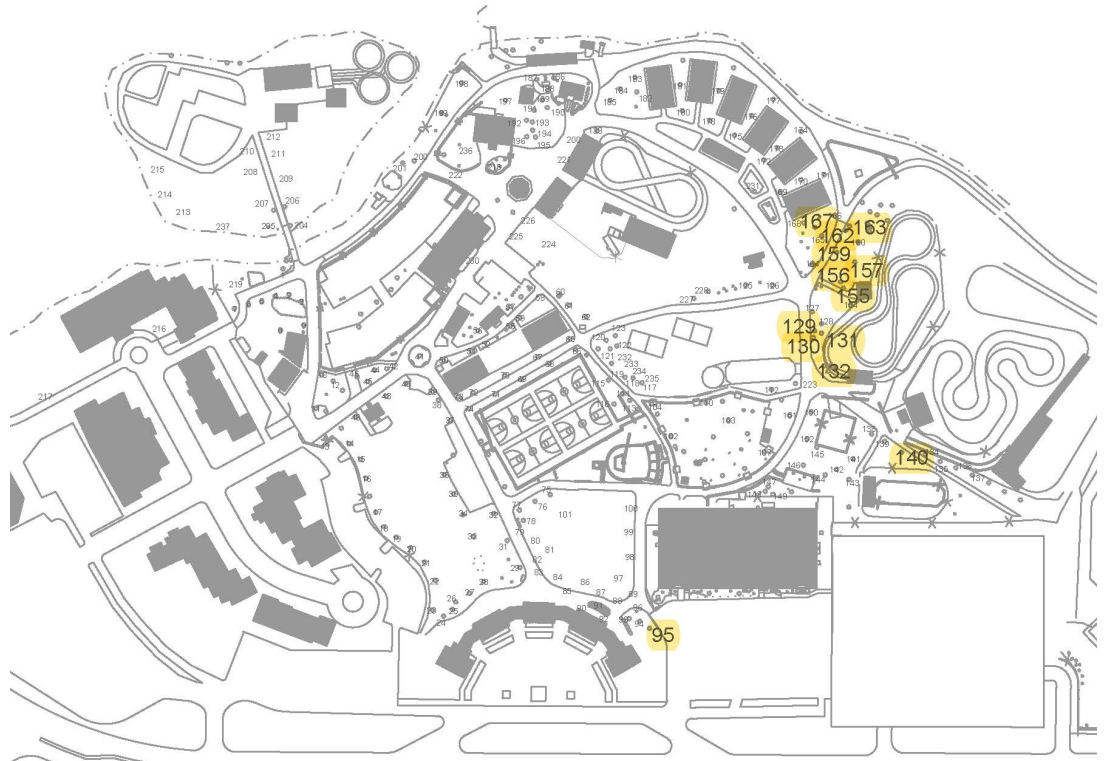
