Massachusetts to Delaware, west to Wisconsin and Arkansas
The Pin Oak is a fast-growing oak species. The pyramidal habit with pendulous lower branches, horizontal middle branches, and upright upper branches make Pin Oak easy to recognize from a distance. Leaves are narrow, with pointed tips and 'U'-shaped lobes. In Fall, the leaves turn bronze-red. Small acorns produced are a food source for wildlife.

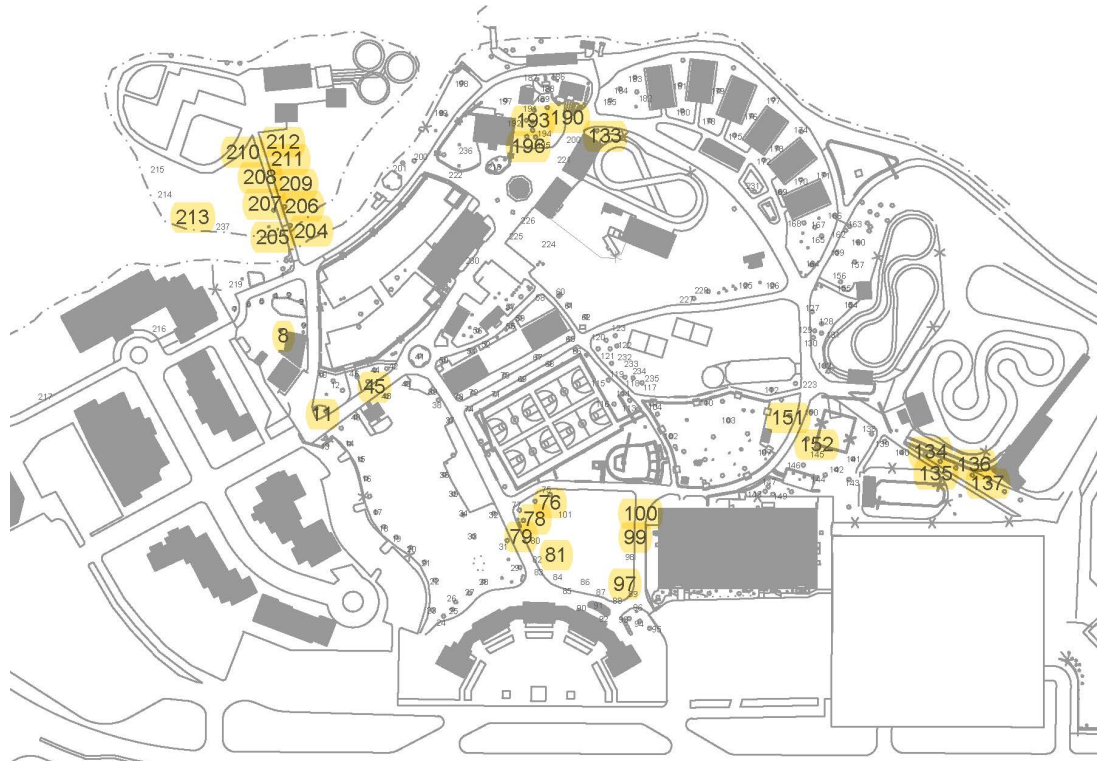
